Does Gorman present elements of activisim in this poem or just a desire for social justice?


Tips:

- 1. You can directly call out the issue or speak to it through the ideals.
- 2. Create goals in the poem.
- 3. Amplify inclusivity and awareness.
- 4. Include "We" to dismantle the "other."

DIDACTIC POETRY

- 1. Didactic poetry is poetry that aims to inform, instruct and improve its readers rather than just entertain them.
- 2. This could be in the form of a valuable moral or life lesson, a rule or instruction, or even knowledge about religion, astrology, arts, sciences, social issues, and other important subjects.
- 3. Didactic poems show the do's and don't of society. This sense of right versus wrong could be based on religious beliefs, political propaganda, history and literature, laws, ethics and morals that are considered 'good' in society. Hence, the message of a didactic poem is subjective to its social and political context.

Sharing the poem with people is part of the activism. Social Justice poems that remain in your notebook don't change anything.



WHAT IS COLLABORATION?

To work jointly with others especially in an intellectual endeavor.

- Poets can collaborate in many ways: Write "Afters" (taking direct inspiration from existing poem), co-write pieces, exquisite corpse (write a stanza but only share the last line for the next poet).
- Requires open-minds, positivity, team work, acceptance, and willingness to go with the flow.

Flow

Theme

How does the theme of peace come through the most? Does utilizing the added layer of recipe/ingredient lexicon work for this collaboration?


Tips:

- 1. Use a central theme/topic.

- 3. Utlize additional lexicon (recipe, instructions etc.)

PROMPTS

Esquisite Corpse

Round robin writing: one person at a time writes a stanza but only reveals the last line (and number if it applies) to the next writer

Line by line
